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SECTION 1: GENERAL CONDITIONS OF BID

1. Proprietary Information

Industrial Development Corporation of SA Ltd (IDC) considers this Request for Proposal (RFP) and all related information, either written or verbal, which is provided to the respondent, to be proprietary to IDC. It shall be kept confidential by the respondent and its officers, employees, agents and representatives. The respondent shall not disclose, publish, or advertise this RFP or related information to any third party without the prior written consent of IDC.

2. Enquiries

- 2.2 Enquiries in relation to this RFP will not be entertained after **16h00 on 24 May 2021**.
- 2.3 The enquiries will be consolidated and IDC will issue one response and such response will be posted, within two days after the last day of enquiries, onto the IDC website (www.idc.co.za) under tenders i.e. next to the same RFP document.
- 2.4 The IDC may respond to any enquiry in its absolute discretion and the bidder acknowledges that it will have no claim against the IDC on the basis that its bid was disadvantaged by lack of information, or inability to resolve ambiguities.

3. Bid Validity Period

Responses to this RFP received from bidders will be valid for a period of 120 days counted from the bid closing date.

4. Instructions on submission of Bids

- 4.1 Bid responses must be submitted in electronic format only and must be e-mailed to the dedicated e-mail address as provided herein.
- 4.2 Bid responses should be in generally acceptable / standard electronic file format/s (i.e. Microsoft suite of products or pdf) to enable access thereto by the IDC for purposes of evaluating responses received. Where documents are presented in a format which cannot be accessed by the IDC through generally acceptable formats, such bid response will be disqualified.
- 4.3 The closing date for the submission of bids is **31 May 2021** not later than **11:00 AM (before midday)**. No late bids will be considered. Bids must **only** be sent to tenders@idc.co.za. Bids sent to any other email address other than the one specified herein will be disqualified and will not be considered for evaluation. It is the bidder's responsibility to ensure that the bid is sent to the correct email address and that this is **received** by the IDC before the closing date and time in IDC's dedicated tender e-mail inbox / address (tenders@idc.co.za).
- 4.4 Bidders are advised to submit / send its bid responses at least 15 minutes before the 11:00AM deadline to avoid any Information Technology (IT) network congestions or

technical challenges in this regard which may result in bid responses being received late. IDC's e-mail servers are configured to receive e-mails with sizes up to 50MB.

- 4.5** The IDC will not be held responsible for any of the following:
- 4.5.1 bid responses sent to the incorrect email address;
 - 4.5.2 bid responses being inaccessible due to non-standard electronic file formats being utilised to submit responses by bidders;
 - 4.5.3 any security breaches and unlawful interception of tender / bid responses by third parties outside the IDC's IT network domain;
 - 4.5.4 bid responses received late due to any IT network related congestions and/or technical challenges; and
 - 4.5.5 bid responses with file size limits greater than IDC's e-mail receipt capacity of 50MB.
- 4.6** Only responses received via the specified email address will be considered.
- 4.7** Where a complete (Inclusive of all Schedules) bid response is **not received** by the IDC in its electronic email tender box (tenders@idc.co.za) by the closing date and time, such a bid response will be regarded as incomplete and late. Such late and / or incomplete bid will be disqualified. **It is the IDC's policy not to consider late bids for tender evaluation.**
- 4.8** Amended bids may be sent to the electronic tender box (tenders@idc.co.za) **marked** "Amendment to bid" and should be received by the IDC **before** the closing date and time of the bid.

5. Preparation of Bid Response

- 5.1** All the documentation submitted in response to this RFP must be in English.
- 5.2** The bidder is responsible for all the costs that it shall incur related to the preparation and submission of the bid document.
- 5.3** Bids submitted by bidders which are, or are comprised of companies must be signed by a person or persons duly authorised thereto by a resolution of the applicable Board of Directors, a copy of which Resolution, duly certified, must be submitted with the bid.
- 5.4** The bidder should check the numbers of the pages of its bid to satisfy itself that none are missing or duplicated. No liability will be accepted by IDC in regard to anything arising from the fact that pages of a bid are missing or duplicated.
- 5.5** Bidder's tax affairs with SARS must be in order (tax compliant status) and bidders must provide written confirmation to this effect as part of their tender response.

6. Supplier Performance Management

Supplier Performance Management is viewed by the IDC as a critical component in ensuring value for money acquisition and good supplier relations between the IDC and all its suppliers.

The successful bidder shall upon receipt of written notification of an award, be required to conclude a Service Level Agreement (SLA) with the IDC, which will form an integral part of the supply agreement. The SLA will serve as a tool to measure, monitor and assess the supplier performance and ensure effective delivery of service, quality and value-add to IDC's business.

Successful bidders will be required to comply with the above condition, and also provide a scorecard on how their product / service offering is being measured to achieve the objectives of this condition.

7. Enterprise and Supplier Development

The IDC promotes enterprise development. In this regard, successful bidders may be required to mentor SMMEs and/ or Youth-Owned businesses. The implications of such arrangement will be subject to negotiations between the IDC and the successful bidder.

8. IDC's Rights

- 8.1 The IDC is entitled to amend any bid condition, bid validity period, RFP specification, or extend the bid closing date, all before the bid closing date. All bidders, to whom the RFP documents have been issued and where the IDC have record of such bidders, may be advised in writing of such amendments in good time and any such changes will also be posted on the IDC's website under the relevant tender information. All prospective bidders should therefore ensure that they visit the website regularly and before they submit their bid response to ensure that they are kept updated on any amendments in this regard.
- 8.2 The IDC reserves the right not to accept the lowest priced bid or any bid in part or in whole. It normally awards the contract to the bidder who proves to be fully capable of handling the contract and whose bid is functionally acceptable and/or financially advantageous to the IDC.
- 8.3 The IDC reserves the right to award this bid as a whole or in part.
- 8.4 The IDC reserves the right to conduct site visits at bidder's corporate offices and / or at client sites if so required.
- 8.5 The IDC reserves the right to consider the guidelines and prescribed hourly remuneration rates for consultants as provided in the **National Treasury Instruction 01 of 2013/2014: Cost Containment Measures**, where relevant.
- 8.6 The IDC reserves the right to request all relevant information, agreements and other documents to verify information supplied in the bid response. The bidder hereby gives consent to the IDC to conduct background checks, including FICA verification, on the bidding entity and any of its directors / trustees / shareholders / members.
- 8.7 The IDC reserves the right, at its sole discretion, to appoint any number of vendors to be part of this panel of service providers.
- 8.8 The IDC reserves the right of final decision on the interpretation of its tender requirements and responses thereto.

9. Undertakings by the Bidder

- 9.1 By submitting a bid in response to the RFP, the bidder will be taken to offer to render all or any of the services described in the bid response submitted by it to the IDC on the terms and conditions and in accordance with the specifications stipulated in this RFP document.
- 9.2 The bidder shall prepare for a possible presentation should IDC require such and the bidder will be required to make such presentation within five (5) days from the date the bidder is notified of the presentation. Such presentation may include a practical demonstration of products or services as called for in this RFP.
- 9.3 The bidder agrees that the offer contained in its bid shall remain binding upon him/her and receptive for acceptance by the IDC during the bid validity period indicated in this RFP and its acceptance shall be subject to the terms and conditions contained in this RFP document read with the bid.
- 9.4 The bidder furthermore confirms that he/she has satisfied himself/herself as to the correctness and validity of his/her bid response; that the price(s) and rate(s) quoted cover all the work/item(s) specified in the bid response documents; and that the price(s) and rate(s) cover all his/her obligations under a resulting contract for the services

contemplated in this RFP; and that he/she accepts that any mistakes regarding price(s) and calculations will be at his/her risk.

- 9.5** The successful bidder accepts full responsibility for the proper execution and fulfilment of all obligations and conditions devolving on him/her under the supply agreement and SLA to be concluded with IDC, as the principal(s) liable for the due fulfilment of such contract.
- 9.6** The bidder accepts that all costs incurred in the preparation, presentation and demonstration of the solution offered by it shall be for the account of the bidder. All supporting documentation and manuals submitted with its bid will become IDC property unless otherwise stated by the bidder/s at the time of submission.

10. Reasons for disqualification

- 10.1** The IDC reserves the right to disqualify any bidder which does any one or more of the following, and such disqualification may take place without prior notice to the offending bidder, however the bidder will be notified in writing of such disqualification:
- 10.1.1 bidders who do not submit an original valid Tax Clearance Certificate and / or proof of application of such as endorsed by SARS on the closing date and time of the bid submission and / or failure to provide the IDC with its SARS issued Tax Verification PIN code giving access to the IDC to electronically verify tax compliance;
- 10.1.2 bidders who submit incomplete information and documentation according to the requirements of this RFP document;
- 10.1.3 bidders who submit information that is fraudulent, factually untrue or inaccurate information;
- 10.1.4 bidders who receive information not available to other potential bidders through fraudulent means;
- 10.1.5 bidders who do not comply with any of the **mandatory requirements** as stipulated in the RFP document;
- 10.1.6 bidders who fail to comply with FICA requirements

11. Local Production and Content

The IDC promotes Local Production and Content. In the case of designated sectors, only locally produced goods, services or works or locally manufactured goods, with a stipulated minimum threshold for local production and content will be considered. IDC reserves the right at its sole discretion to set minimum thresholds for sectors which may not have been declared as designated sectors by **the dti** in an effort to stimulate local production and content where relevant.

Bidders are required to assess their product and /or service offering against the designated sector lists as published by the Department of Trade and Industry (**the dti**) and to ensure full compliance to the minimum local content threshold, if relevant, before submitting its response to this tender. Failure to comply with the requirements assessed in Phase 1 (compliance), may lead to disqualification of bids.

13.2 Phase 2: Technical/ Functionality Evaluation

Bid responses will be evaluated in accordance with the Functional criteria as follows:

13.2.1 Other Functional/ Technical Requirements

With regard to the other Functional Requirements, the following criteria (set out in more detail in section 2 of this RFP document) and the associated weightings will be applicable:

Note: Bidders who score 56 points out of 80 points (70%) or more in total for the functional/technical requirements, will be shortlisted for presentations.

All bids that fail to achieve the minimum overall qualifying score of 70% on functional/technical requirements, including the presentation, will not be considered for further Price and BEE evaluation.

13.3 Phase 3: Preference Point System

All bids that achieve the minimum qualifying score for Functionality (acceptable bids) will be evaluated further in terms of the preference point system, as follows:

14. Promotion of Emerging Black owned Service Providers

It is the IDC's objective to promote transformation across all industries and/ or sectors of the South African economy and as such, bidders are encouraged to partner with a black owned entity (being 50%+1 black owned and controlled). Such partnership may include the formation of a Joint Venture and/ or subcontracting agreement etc., where a portion of the work under this tender would be undertaken by black owned entities. To give effect to this requirement, bidders are required to submit a partnership / subcontracting proposal detailing the portion of work to be outsourced, level of involvement of the black owned partner and where relevant, submit a consolidated B-BBEE scorecard in-line with the provisions of the PPPFA Regulations which will be considered as part of the B-BBEE scoring listed in 13.3.

SECTION 2: FUNCTIONAL REQUIREMENTS SPECIFICATION

1. Special instructions to bidders

- 1.1 Should a bidder have reason to believe that the Functional Requirements are not open/fair and/or are written for a particular service provider; the bidder must notify IDC Procurement within five (5) days after publication of the RFP.
- 1.2 Bidders shall provide full and accurate answers to the questions posed in this RFP document, and, where required explicitly state either "Comply/Not Comply" regarding compliance with the requirements. Bidders **must** substantiate their response to all questions, including full details on how their proposal/solution will address specific functional/ technical requirements; failure to substantiate may lead to the bidder being disqualified. All documents as indicated must be supplied as part of the bid response.
- 1.3 Failure to comply with Mandatory Requirements may lead to the bidder being disqualified.

2. Purpose

The IDC administers the Industrial Policy Support Fund (IPSF) on behalf of the Department of Trade, Industry and Competition ("**the dtic**"). This tender is therefore facilitated by the IDC on behalf of **the dtic**.

The South African Taxidermy is an industry with potential for growth and employment creation across a number of industries. However, the industry has remained fragmented and unused to its full capacity. The purpose of this undertaking is to request proposals from potential service providers to conduct a full study on the South African Taxidermy & Game Skin Industry and propose a concrete and practical strategy for the taxidermy and game skin tannery sector. The strategy focus will be the development of appropriate interventions for the growth, transformation, access to markets, employment creation, and further applications of the industry products.

3. Background Information

South Africa is the third most biological diverse country in the world in terms of species richness and endemism. Conservation and sustainable utilisation of South Africa's renewable resources are thus of strategic importance in terms of provision ecosystem service, now and in the future. These species richness provides an important basis for economic growth and development across a number of industries that underpins the well-being for society.

The biodiversity economy of South Africa encompasses the business and economic activities that either depend on biodiversity for their core business or that contribute to conservation of biodiversity through their activities. The biodiversity economy in South Africa focuses on two sectors, Bioprospecting and Wildlife. The latter is based on four pillars, hunting, breeding, and eco-tourism and wildlife products (including amongst others

game meat, taxidermy and game skin tannery). The focus of this exercise is on taxidermy and tannery, an industry that requires appropriate intervention for its growth and impact on the rest of the value chain.

The Wildlife Industry value chain is centred on wildlife and wildlife ranching activities that are related to the breeding, hunting, eco-tourism and production of game products that include game meat, taxidermy, game skin tannery and by-products. This value chain requires a support strategy for its growth enhancement. The key drivers of the taxidermy and tannery industry, a niche industry in the value chain, are the art products that are derived from the game hunting, using the skin to produce various animal trophies, which is a labour intensive activity. The potential for export of trophies and skins is huge. The industry has high linkages with other industries including furniture, footwear, textile and leather accessories. Furthermore, the sector is characterised by an interesting combination of agriculture, eco-tourism and conservation characteristics.

4. Problem Statement

The NDP, vision 2030 was introduced to guide South Africa's efforts to grow the economy, create jobs and eliminate poverty and inequality. The economic chapter sets specific targets for the country, which include accelerating GDP growth to 5.4% by 2030; increasing the labour force participating rate from 54% in 2010 to 65% in 2030; creating 11 million additional jobs by 2030; reducing unemployment rate to 14% by 2020 and 6% by 2030; and increasing investment as percentage of GDP to 30%, amongst others. This a challenge for the country and its economy in its actual growth path. The potential for the taxidermy and tannery industry, if appropriate support strategy is developed, can contribute largely to the achievement of the 2030 NDP vision.

The 2013 Absa Agriculture Outlook shows private wildlife ranching encompasses more than nine thousand (9000) wildlife ranches (from about 3 500 in year 1992), using more than 20 million hectares of land. The Northern Cape houses approximately 19.5% of South Africa's wildlife ranches, while Eastern Cape is 12.3%. South Africa hosts 20 million game animals, 16 million of which are found in private land and the remaining 4 million on state-owned land. This demonstrate that the industry has a great opportunity for growth with multipliers across its value chain, mainly with private wildlife ranching. Therefore, a strategy that takes into account the South African context is needed.

The 2016 Biodiversity Operation Phakisa's aspiration is to create an inclusive sustainable and responsive wildlife economy that grows at 10% p.a. until at least 2030. The aspiration should provide a foundation for social well-being and maintaining the ecological resource

base through economic growth, transformation and sustainability. The strategy will be developed as a response to such aspiration.

In regard to that aspiration, **the dtic** is commissioning appointing a suitable service provider that will conduct a study of the industry and develop a strategy for the South African taxidermy and tannery industry. The strategy should be immediately implementable for the growth of the industry in terms of contribution to GDP, employment creation, transformation and access to local and global markets. The development of such strategy should provide insight on how to address the challenges currently faced by the sector, determine the growth path for the sector and specify about the manner in which value is being added to the overall national biodiversity economy strategy and contribution to the economy.

5. Objectives

The objective of this RFP is to appoint a suitable independent service provider that will support **the dtic** to undertake the development of a national strategy for the South African taxidermy and game skin tannery industry within a period of nine (9) months. The strategy will seek to address challenges and opportunities for the growth and stimulation of the sector for local and export markets penetration, job creation, transformation and disinhibition of the industry.

6. Methodology

The service provider is required to submit a proposal that is fully responsive to the terms of reference and outlines the following:

A detailed, well thought and articulated methodological approach that will be applied to undertake this assignment. The approach should include but not limited to the following:

- Specify how the data will be collected;
- Outline appropriate modelling tools and techniques that will be applied to analyse data;
- Show understanding of the biodiversity sector/natural products/wildlife economy;
- Identify and map value chains in the natural products and wildlife industries;
- Suggest the approach to the economic development strategies;
- Outline stakeholders to engage in the process; and
- Project management.

Note: A list of references demonstrating similar work and/or experience will be needed.

7. Scope of Work

The scope of work for this assignment includes, but is not necessarily limited to the following:

- Conduct an analysis of existing national and international strategies and programmes that contribute to the development of a sustainable taxidermy and game skin economy. Extract relevance of these strategies to the existing national biodiversity economy and present findings in a report;
- Consult with relevant government stakeholders as well as private sector in the analysis of existing strategies and programmes and the needs requirements for the development of the national strategy for the South African taxidermy and game skin tannery industry as outlined in the stakeholder consultation sessions;
- Map existing sustainable value chains of the taxidermy and game skin tannery industry in South Africa. Conduct a gap analysis to identify additional required sustainable value chains in the taxidermy and game skin tannery sectors in South Africa, and propose recommendations on the development of such value chains;
- Evaluate the potential impact of the taxidermy and game skin tannery sectors for sustainable economic development (investment growth, GDP contribution, trade i.e. imports and exports and employment) and identify key interventions to unlock the identified potential;
- Sector overview: a detailed overview of the sector highlighting all demand and supply issues. Amongst others, these should include all role players such as, game farmers, outfitters, hunters, taxidermist, tanneries and National, Provincial and Local Government;
- Products, market size and value legislative and regulatory landscape, etc. Taxidermy and tannery sector challenges and opportunities (SWOT);
- Key action programmes, target and key performance indicators for addressing identified challenges and exploiting identified opportunities;
- Clear, practical and implementable recommendations on how the strategy will be implemented. Indication of resources and structures that will be required to implement the strategy (e.g. key government departments, industry players, skills, etc.);
- Propose different types of support instruments such as grants, loans or any other ways of support and assistance to the industry, and how the impact of such instrument can be evaluated;

- Propose an effective coordination mechanism for the taxidermy and game skin tannery sectors for consolidated implementation, monitoring and reporting progress on implementation of the strategy;
- Suggest mechanisms for the transformation of the taxidermy and game skin tannery sector through the incorporation of marginalised communities;
- Conduct consultations with different governments to unearth their investment plans and programmes to feed into the model and scenarios;
- Recommend mechanisms to facilitate private sector investments and Public Private Partnerships;
- Make recommendations on required infrastructure development for the taxidermy and game skin tannery sector;
- Make recommendations on measures to ensure national coordination of research in the taxidermy and game skin tannery sector; and
- With the information obtained in the research study, an appropriate strategy under the project must include the following;
 - a. Strategy development to address challenges and constraints in the sector;
 - b. Wildlife value chain and taxidermy sector overview, production, market, global trends and their impacts on the South African taxidermy sector;
 - c. Transforming the taxidermy and tannery profile; transformation of the sector through BBBEE and Black Industrialist (BI) programme, provide certain advantages to the economy;
 - d. Regulations, Acts, tariffs protection, identify gaps and opportunities in these regulations, etc.;
 - e. Wildlife sector value chain: detailed value chain outlined from game farming, raw material up to final products;

Annexure 8: BEE Commitment Plan

The IDC encourages existing vendors and prospective bidders to support the objectives of B-BBEE and as far as possible strive to improve their B-BBEE contribution status.
